

The Ten Commandments (in brief): The 5th Commandment:

We continue Commandments 4th through 10th which express love for neighbor.

Recall: Christ elevated the Commandments of the Old Law: The Old Law read: “You shall love your neighbor as yourself”: Christ commands: “Love one another as I have loved you.” This is the Christian standard for *love of neighbor*.

In today’s Gospel, Jesus Christ shows us how to act towards our neighbor. He tells a sorrowing mother not to weep; and removes the source of her weeping i.e., raising her son to life. His example of mercy is our template in how to love each other e.g., we must speak words of mercy & we must do works of mercy. Today, we present the 5th Commandment:

Thou shalt not kill. Ex.20:13 The commandment regards murder, which is the killing of an innocent human person. (references: The Faith, by Fr. John Hardon, SJ)

1009. How did Christ elevate the 5th Commandment?

He did so in two ways: 1) by forbidding the interior sins of anger and envy, which lead to murder; by commanding His followers to love their enemies in imitation of His own love for those who unjustly condemned Him to death. Jesus Christ says, *if anyone is angry with his brother, he is liable to judgment.* (Mt 5:22) Have I cursed or wished ill to anyone? When living, Jesus Christ commanded: *Love your enemies, do good to them that hate you and pray for them that persecute you and calumniate you.* (Mt 5:44) When dying Jesus Christ said from the Cross: *Forgive them Father for they know not what they do.* (Lk 23:34) Have I *really* forgiven my persecutors? St. Paul adds, *Bless those who persecute you, bless and do not curse.* (Rm 12:14) Do I show a true Christian love for my enemy by how I talk to or about them?

1010. What is legitimate defense?

It is the use of violent means to defend one’s own life or that of others. In the words of St. Thomas, “Defense can encompass two actions: the preservation of one’s life and the aggressor’s death; the first is intended, the second is not.”

1011. Why are we permitted to defend our own lives?

The basic reason is that authentic self-love is a fundamental principle of morality. In fact, self defense even to the point of allowing the aggressor to die can be a serious duty for those responsible for the lives of others and for the common good of the family or the state.

1013. Is capital punishment ever justified?

Yes, since justly condemned criminals are unjust aggressors of society. Moreover, civil authority has the duty to preserve public order, provide for the safety of its citizens, and inflict punishments as a compensation for the disorder caused by crime.

1036. What is worship of the body?

It is the neopaganism that sacrifices all else for the welfare of the body. It idolizes physical perfection & success in sports. Am I more attentive about my pills than Holy Communion? Do I comb my hair more than my conscience? Do I gaze at myself in a mirror more than look for defects in my soul? Am I more concerned for my muscles than my prayer? Do I think on having longer eye lashes over the lashing of my Lord? Do I pout when my football team loses? Is there some neopaganism in me?
