All Souls Day: a review of Purgatory

<u>Definition</u>: Purgatory is the place of suffering in which the souls of those who have not completely satisfied expiating for their sins and the temporal punishment due to them are purified so that they might enter into heaven.

<u>Purgatory in the Bible</u>: The word "purgatory" is not found in scripture, but the concept is.

In the Old Testament, we read how Judas Maccabees believed that souls who died in battle with idols on them had to be punished and for that reason ordered that sacrifice be offered for their souls in Jerusalem saying, "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins." (2 Mac 12:46). This cannot refer to those in heaven nor those in hell for those in heaven have no need of our prayers and those in hell cannot profit from them.

In the New Testament, Jesus Christ implies that there are some sins which may be remitted after this life: "He that shall speak against the Holy Spirit, it shall not be forgiven him, neither in this world nor in the world to come." Again, this implies some sins are purged after death, in some middle place. (Mt 12:32) And, in another place, Christ compares purgatory to a debtor's prison: "Amen I say to thee, thou shall not go out from thence till thou repay the last farthing." (Mt 5:26) And St. Paul says of some that they will be saved, "yet so as through fire." (1 Cor 3:15); and, again, this is the purpose of Purgatory i.e., to destroy the residue of forgiven sin.

<u>Purgatory in tradition</u>: The idea of purgatory is also found in the tradition of what the Church has always done. The practice of the *Memento for the dead* at holy Mass is an example. Also, St. Augustine (430+) records that his mother, Monica, petitioned him on her death bed: "Bury me where you will, only, I pray you, think of me always at the altar of God." (<u>Confessions</u>) Obviously, Monica believed that the holy Mass could assist her soul even after death to heaven; why else ask for this prayer? Another early witness, St. Gregory Nazianzen (389+), says, "In the afterlife there is a baptism of fire, a hard and weary baptism, to destroy what is earthy in man."

<u>Purgatory from reason</u>: Reason itself demands such a place. Every man has been made by God to know, love, and serve God in this life so that he might be with Him forever in the next; and we are commanded to love God with all our heart, mind and soul. (Mt 22:37) But how many perfectly fulfill this task? There are many souls that pass into eternity which are neither wholly good nor completely bad. They are not good enough to go to heaven for scripture says, "Nothing unclean can enter heaven." (Rv 21:27); but nor are they bad enough to go to hell, because they have not rejected God. Justice and logic demand such a place as purgatory.

<u>Pains of purgatory</u>: As in hell, there is a pain of sense and a pain of loss in purgatory. Unlike hell, however, there is the comforting thought that these punishments are temporary. Yet they remain severe while they last; a slight idea of them may be considered when compared to the pains of sense and loss we experience in this life.

<u>Assistance for the poor souls in purgatory</u>: The poor souls cannot help themselves; they can only endure. But we can help them: "It is therefore a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead that they may be loosed from their sins." (2 Mac 12:46)
